A win for Colchester by 662 points so they are the Division winners for this year so congratulations to them (we won it in 2022!). Thanks go to all our members who shot in our teams this year and especially Stephen and Chip, who took part in our Club's Team for the first time in this match.

Our first Spoon Shoot of the Indoor Season took place on the weekend 6th to 8th October 2023.

I usually don't include the hits and golds section but by way of explanation, if there's a tie on total score between two archers then the result is decided firstly by the number of hits and then the number of golds. This system is followed through most of the general Archery shoots, whether on straight score or with handicap totals.

The Indoor Handicapping System is set by Archery GB and both the Indoor and Outdoor systems are both run in the same way. As soon as people have shot three Portsmouth or other rounds after July 1st this year they will then have an indoor handicap rating, especially if they've actually given them to the Indoor Records Officer using one of the slips in the Score Box or with a screen shot if they have the technology. Please be aware, though, that the Spoon Shoots and other competitions should also be scored on one of our written score sheets and what is on that is what will be taken as your score, whatever's on your 'phone, so do check it's correct. Please don't leave the adding up to the end, keep checking that your scores are being entered correctly and add the running totals as you go. Speaking as someone

who has previously been a Records Officer, if this is not done, it delays the final results being prepared and has even been known to make the relevant Records Officer very grouchy!

The various handicapping systems formulated over the years have generally been regarded as dark and arcane by most members but they really are quite straightforward although there are now many more classes and sections than there were originally. In the distant past, archers did keep their own reckonings, just to check the Records Officer was keeping their rating accurately, but that was before computers reared their head and there are now programmes that are (supposed to) work everything out for you. There has already been one update to the Golden Records System being used and probably anomalies will continue to pop up as time goes on. At the risk of confirming my status as a fossil, the original, somewhat prehistoric system, did work without the aid of electricity!

Our Annual Field Championships took place on Sunday 22nd October 2023. The day was, again, very pleasant with lots of sunshine. We really have been lucky with the weather on all of our Championship days this year and the photographs below show this quite well. The results sheet for the shoot is on a separate page at the end of this newsletter.

Our "bespoke" handicapping system once again worked very well, with some ties decided on hits.











Shown are our Field Trophy table with our new medal centres celebrating our 70th Anniversary. These are also available as pin badges.

The picture above right on the previous page is our Gentlemen's Longbow Trophy. The hallmarked silver plate I had made where I used to work by Marlow Bros, Silversmiths, and the engraving was done by Larry O'Connell, a noted boxer as an amateur and a World class Boxing referee. The leather bracer was made by another member, George Weaver and the wood base is of yew, made by John Rayment (now a professional actor) who was also a good shot and a former Essex Clout Champion too! On the back, based on a 17th Century original, there are discs attached to the laces engraved with the year and the name of the Champion.

The notes that follow may be familiar to our members. They are purely my own opinions gathered over many years of shooting at various levels and I found they worked for me. I've gone over these things in newsletters over the years but it should do no harm to print them again!

There are various things that can help with the consistency that helps your arrows to group. There is nothing inherently "wrong" with dropping your bow arm as you loose your arrows. Nothing wrong, that is, if you drop your arm the same amount on every shot! Our members will mostly be quite familiar with my observation to keep their "bow arm pointed towards the target until the arrow hits". This doesn't make any difference to the good, well shot arrows, they'll hit where they're aimed anyway (not necessarily in the middle!). The difference will seen in those less well shot arrows that we all get and can make a couple of points difference in each of those errant arrows, which will make a considerable difference at the end of a round. Anyway, a well-shot arrow will be affected less by the weather than a poorly-shot one.

If you think you won't shoot well, for whatever reason (wind, rain, etc.) it's very likely that you won't! Confidence in yourself is probably the most important thing. Self-doubt is the things that nibbles at the roots of Archery.

This last is in the style of an Elizabethan rhyming couplet.

"If you believe, you will achieve, But if you don't, you won't."

Some people are happy just shooting arrows and accept that, given the time they can take part in Archery, they won't always hit the middle. Others may want to shoot well all the time. This doesn't happen, even at the elevated level of the Olympics. The top archers put so much time into dedicated practice and coaching sessions they achieve a level of consistency that is guite amazing but even they get the odd arrow that doesn't go where they thought it should.

Our October Spoon Shoot took place over the weekend of the 6th/8th October and the results were as follows.
